# MAIN STREET PRESENTS CONVERSATION MATTERS: A PROGRAM TO CONNECT, ENGAGE AND INSPIRE THE MONTGOMERY COUNTY COMMUNITY

Program Made Possible Through Maryland Humanities Grant Program, Major Grant

(ROCKVILLE) — Main Street Connect is pleased to announce that it is launching a new virtual series called <u>Conversations Matter</u>. The program was developed to support community members by creating a public forum that uses the humanities to respond to, interpret and shed light on the unrest in our country.

Main Street Connect, in concert with thought partners and local leaders The Montgomery County Collaboration Council, Donte's Boxing and Wellness Foundation and Virtues Matter, has created this free, virtual, weekly four-part series that will begin on Tuesday, January 19th. The series will focus on local Black history, injustices that have been experienced by people with disabilities and people of color, how we can all engage in social action opportunities to work against racial injustice and, finally, how we can learn and grow through meaningful conversation. Participants will choose from an array of suggested educational offerings ranging from literature, poetry, videos, documentaries, movies and more to prepare themselves to learn and engage during the series. This will help attendees to gain a deeper understanding of the topics explored throughout the series.

To that end, Main Street developed the first of its kind multi-purpose model - an affordable, accessible and inclusive apartment complex and community center in Rockville, Maryland. The site is a central hub, offering a community of support, facilitating engagement opportunities and providing an affordable place to live and thrive.

Main Street promotes accessibility, learning, wellness and inclusion in its layout and operations. It is a long overdue departure from the isolated housing and community options that currently exist for adults with disabilities. Main Street's goal is to promote emotional, intellectual, physical, social, spiritual, environmental and financial wellbeing for its residents and community members of all abilities. Main Street sponsors events to educate and advocate more broadly in the community across sectors for individuals with disabilities.
